Status Cards Now Issued at Band Office



Band Members that are in need of a new Certificate of Indian Status Card (CIS) can now visit our Band Office on Mountain Road. Having recently completed all required training, receptionist Honey Chicago earned the title of "Indian Registration Administrator" (IRA). Status Cards will be issued on Wednesdays (1:00 p.m. to 3:00 pm.) by scheduled appointment only. Please note that at this time, LDMLFN is only issuing cards to Band Members registered with the First Nation.

Individuals wishing to access this service must follow these steps:

- 1) Contact Honey Chicago at the Band Office to schedule an appointment. Please remember that appointments can only be made on Wednesdays and Honey will do her best to schedule you in to the earliest timeslot available.
- 2) When you come to your appointment, you must bring a copy of your birth certificate (long or short form), or two pieces of valid government-issued ID (Provincial or Federal)* Please check our LDMLFN website for updated information about what

you need to apply for your card

Please note that only the older laminated Status Cards will wishing to apply for the new Secured Certificate of Indian

be issued through the LDMLFN Band Office. Individuals Status must do so through an AANDC issuing office and can visit https://www.aadnc-aandc.gc.ca for more information.

From the Office of Chief and Council

Boozhoo to our Membership and Families! We hope that all of our families are in good health and good spirits as we welcome in the fall season and start preparing for the colder months ahead. Fall is always a busy time out on the land for our people as they hunt moose and engage in other land-based traditional sustenance activities.

Community Land Base

We are extremely pleased to report that many of our community members were able to spend time out at the community land base throughout the summer months. Almost every weekend, our Cultural Complex was booked with community members who wanted to spend time out on the land and the water with their families. People both young and old were able to access their traditional lands because of the development, which provides a communal space for people to gather. We continue to fulfill our commitment to helping our members return to their ancestral territory as we carry on with the lot surveying and our negotiations with AANDC for water and infrastructure funding. The upcoming federal election has affected the flow of information to and from our leadership and has hindered the federal government's decision-making process, but we are hopeful that we will have a finalized commitment to outfit the lots with septic systems and wells in the very near future. We are also happy to announce that when the Cultural Complex is not being utilized by community members, we are able to host other First Nation community members and organizations who require space for educational and administrative activities. It is good for our community to continue to build strong relationships with other Anishinabe communities and organizations. Moreover, opening our Complex to these partners also generates revenue to maintain our beautiful facility and keep our development plan moving forward.

Flood Claim Negotiations

Our Flood Claim Negotiations Team continues to liaise with both the federal and provincial Lead Negotiators. Since the Summer Newsletter, we have applied ongoing pressure to both provincial and federal levels of government and we have made significant progress. Finalization of this process will require an easement agreement that is approved by all parties and we are working diligently to achieve this. We anticipate a detailed response following the October election. We are still aiming to be in a position to reach a final settlement by the end of 2015. When this occurs, it will then go to the membership for a Referendum Vote, to either accept or reject the offer. In order to ensure we are prepared, we have also instructed our legal counsel to begin the process of establishing a trust.

Dallan Forestry Update

In the month of August, a new collective bargaining agreement was reached between Dallan and Resolute's Fort William Sawmill. We are very pleased to say, that to date, 11 Band/community

Approximately 33% of Dallan's workforce is made up of Aboriginal workers from LDML and surrounding communities. Dallan has four mill yard services contracts with Resolute Forest Products covering their Thunder Bay Pulp Mill, Thunder Bay Sawmill, Atikokan Sawmill and Ignace Sawmill.

Flu vaccine clinics start in October and typically run until December. Here are some other ways you can reduce your risk of getting the flu:

Important Information Regarding Dental Hygiene Services

Lac des Mille Lacs First Nation is happy to announce that community members can access dental hygiene services through a new program, called the Non-Insured Health Benefits Direct Billing Dental Hygiene Pilot Project. This project is spearheaded by the Chiefs of Ontario Heath Directorate. The goal of the project is to enhance the accessibility of regular dental cleanings to First Nation individuals living both on and off reserve.

There are several Dental Hygienists in the Thunder Bay area who are registered with the program and are happy to accept your Status Card at the time of your appointment. There is no need for you to pay out of pocket and seek reimbursement, providing your status card is valid (not expired). Please note that the yearly maximum amount of dental cleanings, which NIHB funds per individual, has not changed.
