# **NEW-Ontario Electricity Support Program- NEW**

#### Did you know?

If you are a customer of an electricity utility and in a lower-income home, you may qualify for a reduction on your electricity bill through the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP). The amount of the credit you receive depends on two factors: 1) How many people live in your home; and 2) Your combined household income. For example, a home with four people and an annual income of \$37,000 will receive an on-bill credit of \$34 each month.

#### What to do...

Gather up the following: 1) Your electricity bill; 2) Birthdates and names of all residents in your home as registered with the Canada Revenue Agency; 3) Social Insurance Numbers, Individual Tax Numbers, or temporary taxation numbers for residents over the age of 16

### LDMLFN Successful in Attaining over \$500,000 in Infrastructure Funding

In March, Councillor Tracy Morrison together with the Honourable Patricia A. Hajdu, Minister of Status of Women and the Honourable Michael Gravelle, Ontario Minister of Northern Development and Mines, announced that Lac des Mille Lacs First Nation will receive \$531, 234 in infrastructure funding. The funding is for a new solar-powered electric micro-grid that will reduce the First Nation's reliance on diesel and help lower greenhouse gas emissions. It is one of 13 local infrastructure projects in communities across Ontario to receive a share of \$10 million in joint funding from the Governments of Canada and Ontario through the Small Communities Fund.

**Boozhoo to our Membership and Families!** We hope that all of our families are in good health and are keeping warm during these colder months! Spring is just around the corner and we have had very busy and productive months since our last newsletter. At this time, we would like to provide key updates to our membership.

#### **Forestry**

Chief and Council are excited to inform the membership that Dallan Forestry LP (a company owned in partnership with LDMLFN, Nigigoonsiminikaaning First Nation and Dale Levesque) has renewed a six (6) year contract with Resolute Forest Products to provide mill yard services at the Fort William Sawmill site location. Dallan Forestry presently has contracts with Resolute Forest Products to provide mill yard services at the Fort William Sawmill, Thunder Bay Pulp Mill, Atikokan Sawmill, and Ignace Sawmill sites. Dallan Forestry is very proud of the fact that 43% of its employees are First Nation Band Members. 14 LDMLFN band and community members are presently employed with Dallan Forestry and LDMLFN Chief and Council are confident that this number will continue to grow as more of our members submit applications for employment. Also, Dallan LP is currently seeking Heavy Equipment Operators for its Ignace and Atikokan sawmills. Community members are welcome to submit a resume to b.charbonneau@dallanforestry.ca.

Please note that this news is aligned with LDMLFN's commitment to identifying and pursuing new economic opportunities as well as establishing a collaborative process with respect to forest management planning. It is also consistent with the objectives outlined in our Community Economic Development Plan because identifying and engaging in relationships with governments, industry, neighbouring communities, and First Nations is key to the economic health of our community.

# From the Office of Chief and Council (continued)

### Flood Claim Update

After much lobbying with numerous Government Ministries, Ministers, and INAC officials, we are very pleased to announce that both Canada and Ontario have finally presented a global offer for settlement of our Flooding Claim! It is extremely important that the membership understands that the acceptance of the Flood Claim settlement package can and will only be decided by a vote of the membership. It is the opinion of Chief, Council and the entire Team that the proposed numbers are fair, and while we could never fully be compensated for our losses; the people have suffered long enough and wish to see a settlement.

Due to our Negotiations Protocol regarding Confidentiality, we currently are not at liberty to reveal the proposed compensation numbers. This will be presented to the membership in a Referendum package and discussed at our AGM. Our Negotiation team will be in attendance so that they can give their expert opinion and answer any questions regarding the settlement at that time. We are currently focusing our efforts on reaching consensus with both governments on the "Easement Agreement" and "Settlement Agreement" to bring the negotiations to a close.

We are pleased to report that the First Nation and Province have worked on and negotiated an "Easement Agreement." This has now been sent to Canada for their acceptance. We anticipate a favourable response within the next few weeks.

This brings us to the drafting of the "Settlement Agreement," which we hope to have finalized sometime during the month of May 2016. This is the last remaining document to be agreed upon before we can go to Referendum. We are hopeful and aiming to be able to go to Referendum in June 2016. It is of the utmost importance that those registered band members, who are 18 years of age and older, make certain of the following:

- 1. The Band Administration Office has your current and correct mailing address (Note: Please contact Honey Chicago Receptionist, at your earliest opportunity regarding any address changes or to ensure your address is correct on our list at 807-622-9835 ext 221.)
- 2. Members must have a current bank account, opened in their name.

Chief and Council thank you for your continued support and patience. It has been a very long, tiring process, which has consumed much of our efforts. It is reasonable to say that we hope and look forward to seeing closure this summer as we continue on with the healing of our people and Nation. *Chi Miigwetch*. *N.B.
